Children will develop a curiosity for the subject, as well as an understanding of the importance that all types of music can have in any person's life.

Local Context

The end point for all our children is to have the skills, prepare them for the music curriculum at Key Stage 3. As such, we have tracked our curriculum content

The National Curriculum for Music does not sequence

Many of our children come from a background where music and playing an instrument are valued. However, as this is not true of all children, RockSteady is funding some provision for some children to access instrumental playing and WOPS is provided to some year groups to learn the ukulele.

Sheffield has a strong musical tradition from classical concerts to pop artists and visiting festivals. There are also many performance venues to discover new artists. The school has formed links with Sheffield Music Hub as a way of accessing planning and musical resources to be used in school and as part of home learning.

Teacher Assessment

The music curriculum ensures children sing, listen. play, perform and evaluate. This is embedded in the classroom activities as well as the weekly hymn singing, various concerts and performances and the learning of instruments. The elements of music are taught in the classroom lessons so that children can use some of the language of music to be able to appreciate it and analyse it.

The demonstration of good subject and curriculum knowledge is a requirement in the DfE teaching standards. A music specialist has been employed to oversee much of the music teaching to ensure progression and skills are taught at each stage of primary. This encompasses the many skills that music has to offer and making sure the children are accessing

Throughout the lesson, children are encouraged to work collaboratively to plan, adapt, improve, and evaluate their own performance and the performance of others, whilst also understanding the many elements used to make music.

Teachers identify and share the key vocabulary and learning for the lesson. Children can use this vocabulary when planning, adapting, improving, and evaluating their own compositions and the composition of others. Through appraisal of music, children will be able to identify the features of music from different historical periods with names of composers and also gain factual knowledge such as instrument names and note lengths to their own bank of knowledge.

Teachers, through observation on a lesson-by-lesson basis, measure impact. This is judged against the outcomes highlighted at the beginning of the lesson and is shared throughout the lesson.
